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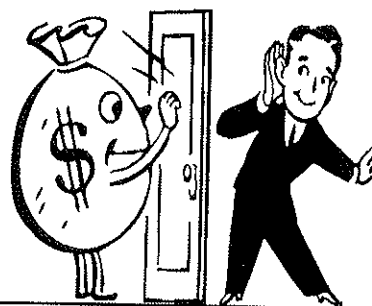
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consult your city or county attorney to be sure your locality acts consistent with its comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance and uses good documentary procedures. Wireless facilities are presumed to be safe, as long as they meet FCC emission standards. A locality cannot deny permission for the placement of a tower on the grounds that it might be harmful to the environment or to residents. The FCC determines hazards, not jurisdictions.

It would be evident, a local wireless communications ordinance is critical in addressing community needs and

document. Some solutions have been to install cell towers within existing church steeples and on tall buildings. Towers have also been made to look like trees.
